Something to Think About—Something to Act Upon:

Representative from the Truth and Reconciliation Commissions Addresses Education Faculty and guests at the University of New Brunswick:



Charlene Bearhead, Education Lead, Truth and Reconciliation, was at the University of New Brunswick where she spoke about the residential schools and the impact these facilities had on the lives of children and their families, stating “89 years in thousands of children’s lives, 25% of the children at residential schools died there from physical abuse, sexual abuse or froze to death.” Ms. Bearhead reminded us that “First

Nations is a group, not a culture.”

Charlene Bearhead turned our attention to the importance of education in addressing these issues, the difficulties in making change happen in our schools and how we decide what changes are needed in the current education system. She addressed such topics as land acquisition, how the system is failing indigenous children, what constitutes good teaching practices relative to what students should know about indigenous people, what it means to be a treaty person and why we are still having conversations about treaty education.

Ms. Bearhead expressed hope that the people she speaks with as she travels across Canada will embrace the need for change, continue to foster and grow a respectful environment and continue what she sees as a “positive, authentic movement toward respecting nation-to-nation relationships.”


International Literacy Day (September 8):

- ✓ Focus on reading, writing and numeracy skills for all girls and women





Advocacy and Action

House of Commons Standing Committee on the Status of Women:

The Committee will be examining violence in the lives of young women and girls with a focus on the following areas: cyber-violence, street harassment, rape culture, hypersexualization, best practices for engaging men and boys in the discussions and best practices and the impact of the issues on vulnerable groups.

CFUW Brief to the Standing Committee on the Status of Women:

On September 6, 2016, CFUW submitted a Brief titled “Study on Violence Against Young Women and Girls in Canada.” This Brief references such areas as rape culture, peer pressure, misunderstanding or disregard of consent, abuse of drugs and alcohol, lack of disciplinary action and non-existent or inaccessible support services. Collectively, this presents a disturbing picture and reinforces the need for immediate action by Government.

In this Brief, CFUW urges the Government to:

- (1) Conduct research into best practises
- (2) Provide colleges and universities with a model reporting and confidentiality protocol
- (3) Pass legislation that would obligate universities and colleges to have a comprehensive sexual misconduct policy, conduct safety audits on campus and have transparent and specific disciplinary systems
- (4) Provide funding to universities and colleges to conduct workshops on bystander interventions and consent and train faculty on taking disclosures an trauma-enforced training

A Note from Karen Dunnett, National President, CFUW:

The following information is a partial quote from the CFUW Bulletin titled “Report on the 32nd GWI Triennial General Assembly” and makes reference to a number of reports which you can read fully by accessing the CFUW Bulletin.

CFUW National President Karen Dunnett states:

“These reports and presentations will give you a broad picture of the information presented. Of course, the GWI dues increase motion that was passed is there. CFUW, as a large National Federation (NFA), gets a reduced rate, so our GWI dues rate increase will be a 9 Swiss Franc (CHF) for 2017, a 5 CHF for 2018, and a 5 CHF for 2019. Please remember that our bylaws state:

“Annual per capita dues shall be set by a special motion passed at an annual general meeting. Written notice outlining any proposed changes to the dues shall be sent to all Clubs at least one hundred and twenty (120) calendar days prior to the annual general meeting.”

This means that no CFUW national membership dues increase can take place this 2016- 2017 fiscal year.

Please note as well that the board has another report to do. It is the report that was requested via a motion made at the CFUW 2016 AGM and Conference. The motion stated:

In light of the close majority vote on June 24, 2016 with respect to Amendment #2 from St Thomas and the upcoming Triennial GWI meeting in Cape Town, we kindly request the Board to complete a report no later than 6 months after the GWI Triennial meeting in Cape Town to propose a proactive way ahead for CFUW.

On behalf of the board, I wanted you to know that the committee has been struck, and the board will have it and our financial situation as the main focus of our first board meeting on September 20th. We want to ensure that we gather as much information as possible, understand all the implications and explore numerous avenues in order to deal with our financial issues and fulfil the request for a proactive report going forward, while keeping the timeline as tight as possible to deliver the report.

Last but not least, I want to extend a special thank you to Cheryl Hayles, VP International Relations along with staff for compiling such a detailed report.”
