




Rebecca Taylor, a student at the NBCC, was awarded the **CFUW Fredericton Bursary** in January 2018.

Rebecca is enrolled in the second and final year of the Practical Nursing Program. This past summer she worked in the emergency room at the Dr. Everett Chalmers Regional Hospital in Fredericton as a patient counselor.

Ashlee Oleinokow, a student at the New Brunswick College of Craft and Design (NBCCD), was awarded the **CFUW Fredericton Aboriginal Scholarship**.

Ashlee is a Multi Media Artist studying Digital Media and is in her second year at the NBCCD. She attended a creative boarding school in Minnesota in high school and then studied Digital Arts at Stetson University in Florida. She has experienced a multitude of different art-forms and techniques. Through these experiences she has learned that her creative process is through discovery rather than creation. Ashlee utilizes her creative abilities as a visual diary for others and for herself. It helps express inner thoughts and emotions that words cannot describe. In life, she says, we experience dark and brightening moments and she wants to represent the reality in people's mind through pieces of her artwork. She strives to break her boundaries and explore her insecurities as she continues her education at the NBCCD.



It was also a pleasure and honour to introduce Dr. Eileen Wallace and to share some of her accolades with those in attendance. Eileen has been a member of CFUW for 71 years, and was a trailblazer in bilingual education. She had an outstanding impact on children's literature, and on the Bachelor's and a Master's Degree in Library and Information Science. The Eileen Wallace Children's Literature Collection is housed in the Harriet Irving Library at UNB. She was presented with an Early Childhood Literacy Award by the New Brunswick Lieutenant-Governor, received an honorary Doctor of Letters from the UNB, and is the 2018 recipient of the Order of New Brunswick. Atlantic Regional Council (ARC) 2018 meeting in Wolfville, NS.

The ARC Conference and CFUW AGM were held on September 28 & 29, 2018 in Wolfville, NS. Fifty-one participants from across the Atlantic Provinces attended the meetings and CFUW Fredericton was represented by 2 delegates: **Sharon Crabb**, Past President, and **Pam Love**, Treasurer.



Events started on Friday evening with a reception at L'Arche Homefires, the conference venue. Jeff Cantwell, the mayor of Wolfville, greeted the delegates and we were treated to keyboard accompaniment throughout the evening. With a delicious anniversary cake, we celebrated CFUW Wolfville's 80th Anniversary and ARC's 30th Anniversary. It was a great time to reunite with old friends, and meet many new ones.



The conference portion of the weekend was held Saturday morning. With the guidance of **Maura Ryan**, Committee Member of the Nova Scotia Advisory Council on the Status of Women, we were asked to consider: "What is inclusiveness?", "What evidence of inclusiveness do you see in your community?", and "What can CFUW clubs and its members do to promote inclusiveness?". Five exceptional speakers led us to think of inclusiveness in a variety of ways.

Carolyn Campbell, Social Justice Educator and activist asked, "...is it enough to open doors to let others in, adding them to our way of doing things?" or, "... could we consider and create a new way of doing things so everyone can belong?"

Ingrid Blais, Director of Wolfville L'Arche Homefires, describes it as community that includes people with and without intellectual disabilities. L'Arche has a candle-making business and a weaving business, and includes several residential houses as part of this nonprofit organization. Ingrid challenged us to think in a positive manner about inclusion and to consider "possibilities" and "contributions" that individuals can make to their communities.

Cynthia Bruce, instructor of disability studies at Acadia University and a member of the Nova Scotia Accessibility Advisory Board, impelled us to recognize our own biases as we privilege and prefer ableism. She spoke about the responsibility of governments to legislate, and for institutions to set standards so that there is accountability for welcoming and supporting all people.

Asa Kachan, the Chief Librarian and CEO of the Halifax Library system, promotes public libraries as a "Place for Everyone." Asa's presentation showed the many ways that the new library in Halifax is becoming a "palace for the people."

The final speaker, **Judith Todd**, shared stories around her work with a Bangladeshi refugee woman named "Sumayia". Responding her needs, Judith found others who were willing to respond until "Sumayia" had a group of 16 friends, including an immigration lawyer. Judith believes in "the power of people who believe in change."



After a buffet lunch, we proceeded to the business meeting. This included the ratification of two ARC executive positions that had been vacant. **Margaret Therrien** of Halifax, NS is the new Secretary-Treasurer and **Grace Stapleton** of St. John's, NFLD., is the Vice-President of ARC. **Grace Hollett** presented an update of GWI and CFUW national negotiations. **Sharon Crabb** extended an invitation to ARC members to attend the ARC Conference and AGM to be held in Fredericton in October 2019.

Did you know...?

In 1992 the national CFUW conducted a "Survey of the Status of Female Faculty and Students at Canadian Universities" in order to determine the status of women in these institutions of higher learning. **Twenty-five years** later (2017), CFUW conducting a replica of the 1992 study.

Findings are:

- Similar limited availability of on and off campus child care.
- Slight increase in policy defining gender balance course content.
- Increase in incentives for women in male dominated fields.
- Gender wage gap remains for female faculty.
- Significant decrease in gender-neutral language policies.
- Increase of female faculty hired for tenure-track position.
