CFUW Fredericton Annual General Meeting Minutes, June 16, 2022, in person

CFUW Fredericton Annual General Meeting June 16, 2022 Forest Hill United Church, 12:00 noon

Prior to our AGM, lunch was provided and members had the opportunity to meet and greet and to purchase tickets and chose from a number of items when their ticket was drawn.

The CFUW Fredericton AGM commenced at 12:25 p.m. with a welcome message from Bo.

Acceptance of the Agenda: It was moved by Connie, seconded by Myrna, that the Agenda be accepted as presented. Motion Carried

Minutes of the June 3, 2021, AGM and Business Arising from the Minutes: It was moved by Anne, seconded by Claire, that the Minutes be accepted as presented. Motion Carried

President's and Vice President's Report: This report is located on page 6 of the Annual Report. Bo reviewed some of the work of the President and Vice President. There was a brief discussion regarding the Pop-Up Book Sale held at the Brookside Mall on May 27 and 28 and previous meetings held via Zoom. Action: The topic of meetings for our 2022-2023 year will be revisited with discussions to determine whether meetings will continue on Zoom or move to in-person.

Committee Reports: The Committee Reports are located on pages 7-13 of the Annual Report. Members were invited to share any information from their reports. The following comments were:

- Sharon thanked all members who volunteered during the Pop-Up Book Sale, sorting, sale days and clean up days. She thanked Wendy for all the dedication, work and commitment in assisting with every facet of the Book Sale. Wendy gave a brief response.
- Regarding future a Book Sale, it was suggested we involve our scholarship recipients and invite students from UNB, STU, Community Colleges to assist.
- Shelley suggested we hold a meeting for students prior to the Book Sale and other events.
- 4 Bo suggested we focus on student volunteers.
- It is hoped that we are able to hold our CFUW Fredericton Open House in September and suggested we approach St. Thomas University for support with this event

Special Interest Groups: These Reports are located on pages 14-15 of the Annual Report. Members were invited to share any information from their reports. Pam indicated a decision will need to be made regarding Book Club gatherings—Zoom or in-person gatherings. Jean continues to collect CFUW Fredericton materials for the Archives.

Treasurer's Report: The Treasurer's Report and the Proposed Budget are located on pages 16-17 of the Annual Report. Pam presented the Treasurer's Report for May 1, 2021, to April 30, 2022. It was noted that the monies from the Pop-Up Book Sale are not included in this report as this event occurred in May 2022. The Report shows a deficit balance for our 2021-2022 year as we were unable to conduct much fundraising. It was moved by Pam, seconded by Edye, that we accept the Treasurer's Report as presented. Motion Carried

Pam indicated that the Proposed Budget for May 1, 2022, to April 30, 2023, was prepared in January 2022 and presented to members for approval in February 2022. At that time, there were identified budget items which were put on hold pending possible monetary returns from a fundraiser in our 2022-2023 year. Action: The Finance Committee will meet in the fall of 2022 to review and recommend revisions to this Proposed Budget based on funds raised at our Pop-Up Book Sale. Karen asked for responses specific to such items as funding allocations for the AGM, high school scholarships and library grants. Pam indicated that these budgetary items would be discussed at the Finance Committee meeting. It was moved by Pam, seconded by Edye, that any changes to the Proposed Budget would be identified at the Finance Committee and presented to the members for further discussion and approval. Motion Carried

Nominations Committee Report: This Report is located on page 18 of the Annual Report. The Committee is comprised of Jean and Sharon. Sharon presented the Nominations Committee Report noting one change. The Co-President position is changed from Bo Miedema to Bo Miedema and Anne Soucy. The positions of Vice President and Recording Secretary are currently vacant. Sharon called for nominations from the floor for each of the positions listed on the Nominations Committee Report. Hearing no nominations from the floor, Sharon moved the Nominations Committee Report be accepted as amended, seconded by Pam. Motion Carried.

Other Business: Two additional items were added to the Agenda under Other Business— CFUW National Name Change and voting delegate attending the CFUW Conference and AGM

- CFUW Fredericton Motion: The following proposed amendments to the CFUW Fredericton Constitution were presented for ratification by the members:
 - Page 4, By-Law 4—Committees—Item 1: Removal of "Book Fair" thus Item 1 would read: "As required by the Executive Committee, Standing Committees such as Education and Scholarships, Membership, Programme, Publicity, Library and Creative Arts, Finance and Issues may be established and the appointments of their conveners ratified by the Voting Body at the next Annual General Meeting".
 - Page 5, By-Law 7—Duties of Conveners and Archivist—Item 7: "Removal of Item 7—thus the Items listed under By-Law would be listed from 1-8 to replace the current listing of 1-9".

Following discussions, it was moved by Sharon, seconded by Connie, that the proposed amendments to the CFUW Fredericton Constitution be accepted. Motion Carried.

- CFUW Fredericton Voting Delegate at the August CFUW Conference and AGM:
 - At the August CFUW Conference and AGM, the slate of CFUW Board Nominations for 2022-2024 will be presented. There are two nominees for the position of VP International Relations—Barbara DuMoulin and Lynne Kent. By

consensus, it was determined that CFUW Fredericton would vote in favour of Lynne Kent.

- It was moved by Pam, seconded by Connie, that our CFUW Fredericton voting delegate at the CFUW Conference and AGM, may vote on any other motions as she deems appropriate. Motion Carried.
- ♣ CFUW Name Change Proposals: Bo presented some background regarding the possible change in name of CFUW National from the current CFUW (Canadian Federation of University Women) to an as yet unidentified name. In discussing this potential name change, the following ideas were presented "CFW (Canadian Federation of Women") and "CFUW (Canadian Federation of United Women"). Bo will be attending the CFUW Town Hall via Zoom on June 16, 2022 where the proposed name change will be discussed. Action: Bo will send out further information to members following this CFUW Town Hall.
- 4 Other Business: Bo spoke about the success of our two webinars presented in February and April 2022. Questions were raised whether we wished to consider offering webinars in our 2022-2023 year and, if so, what format and when (during the day or evenings). No decisions were made at this time as this will be discussed further at our general meeting in September or October.

Karen attended the Fredericton Music Festival and expressed her thanks to the members for providing her access to the tickets.

Libraries and Creative Arts Report 2022-2023 (4)

The Committee was comprised of Anne Soucy, Convener, Sharon Crabb and Jean Fisher. Our CFUWF invitation letters for the Library applications were sent to Education offices in both Fredericton and Oromocto. These were distributed by the Education offices to schools in their districts with a deadline of March 17th, 2023. Eleven grant proposals were received by the deadline. We were very pleased with the number of applications this year as it has been a very difficult year for the schools.

The Committee decided that six (6) grants of \$500 each would be awarded. All members of the Committee were forwarded the 11 grant proposals. The Committee then met on March 28th to discuss the grant proposals. The unanimous decision was the following schools would be awarded grants: Nashwaak Valley School, Lincoln Elementary Community School, Minto Elementary and Middle School, Geary Elementary, Harvey Community Library and McAdam Elementary. Letters of congratulation with a cheque for \$500 from CFUW were sent out to the selected schools. A letter was also sent to all the other schools who had submitted applications thanking them for their application and encouraging them to apply again next year.

This year we were pleased to offer a Creative Arts Grant in the amount of \$1,000.00. Invitations to apply were sent to 4 organizations. One application was received from the Fredericton Kiwanis Youth Choir. The Committee agreed that that Creative Arts Grant would be awarded to the Fredericton Kiwanis Youth Choir. A letter of congratulations was sent.

We were pleased to submit an application for the CFUW Library Award for the Fredericton Kiwanis Youth Choir. This \$4,000.00 is awarded biennially alternating between Library and Creative Arts and is set the CFUW Charitable Trust. We were extremely pleased that our submission for the Fredericton Kiwanis Youth Choir was approved by CFUW Charitable Trust

Thank you to Committee members, Sharon Crabb and Jean Fisher for all your work throughout the year.


Publicity Report 2021-2022 (5)



At the October meeting we identified two potential fundraisers, a Book Fair in May 2023 and a yard sale in October 2023. At the December meeting, many of the details relevant to holding our May 2023 Book Fair were clarified. The April meeting centered on very detailed discussions of the necessary preparations for our May 2023 Book Fair. As the potential yard sale will be held in October 2023, any discussions of that event were tabled until August 2023.

CFUW Fredericton Fundraising Committee Pop-Up Book Sale Fundraiser, May 2022

During September and October, 2021, the Fundraising Committee commenced plans for a Harvest Book Sale. Unfortunately, those plans had to be put on hold because of an increase in COVID restrictions. In April 2022, the Committee again commenced plans to host a Pop-Up Book Sale to be held May 27 and 28, 2022.

Arrangements were made with Brookside Mall where we were assigned a donations and sorting location which we accessed from May 12-30 for the purposes of receiving and sorting book donations from 9:00-3:00, setting up in the lobby in preparation for our Book Sale, hosting our Book Sale and cleaning out the sorting location after the sale.

Some of the major tasks in hosting this Pop-Up Book Sale were:

- Identifying the book categories we would accept for this Book Sale
- Preparing a poster and Facebook posting announcing our Book Sale
- Advertising our sorting and sale days
- Hiring a trucking firm to pick up boxes of books stored in three locations and delivering these boxes to our sorting area
- Preparing and emailing volunteer time sheets for both the sorting days, the sale days and the cleanup days
- Picking up stored empty boxes and delivering them to the sorting area
- Arranging with Brookside Mall to set up tables in the lobby
- Hiring a trucking firm to move the boxes of books from the sorting area to the tables in the lobby
- Hosting the Book Sale, including volunteers serving as floor walkers and cashers
- At the end of the Book Sale, removing remaining boxes back to the sorting area and preparing these boxes for pick-up by volunteers from St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church in Lincoln
- Preparing a number of empty boxes for storage
- Preparing and delivering "thank you" notes to the Brookside Mall, Firestone, Fredericton Exhibition Centre and other businesses/people as identified
- Packing boxes of books and delivering them to the Salvation Army
- And sundry other items

Thank you to all our volunteers for giving their time and energy as without them we could not have held this Book Sale fundraiser. The "thank you" letter sent to all volunteers is included at the end of this report. Thank you to our CFUW Fredericton treasurer, Pam, for all her work associated with preparing and monitoring the floats/cash, making deposits and all other financial work associated with hosting a Book Sale. The Book Sale Financial Report is included at the end of this report. Thank you to the CFUW Fredericton Fundraising Committee, Jean, Wendy, Edye, Bo and Shelley, who saw the merit in holding our Pop-Up Book Sale and worked tirelessly in carrying this fundraising idea to fruition. Thank you to CFUW Fredericton members for your support and encouragement.

Thank you letter sent to volunteers:

After 3 years without a CFUW Fredericton Book Fair, we were finally able to host our CFUW Fredericton Pop-Up Book Sale fundraiser on May 27 and 28, 2022!

This happened because of YOU—all our fabulous volunteers!!!!!

On May 16-20 and May 24-25, volunteers worked in the sorting centre at the Brookside Mall, accepting donations, sorting books into our identified categories, filling and stacking boxes, identifying books which we could not use at our Book Sale, but could be forwarded to another non-profit charity, such as the Salvation

Army; volunteers filled their trucks and cars with empty boxes and delivered these boxes to the sorting area; volunteers prepared the various signage need for posting at various locations in the Brookside Mall and prepared and monitored the volunteer work schedules for both the sorting days and the Book Sale days

- Further, on May 25, volunteers worked arranging tables in the Mall lobby in preparation for the transfer of boxes of books from the sorting area
- On May 26, all the boxes of books were transferred from the sorting areas to the tables in the lobby by Bob's Trucking and volunteers then arranged the boxes, removed box lids, covered the boxes with table cloths, put up appropriate signage, arranged the cash tables, completed all other work in preparation for our Book Sale days and "books sat" the boxes until the Mall closed
- On May 27 and 28, volunteers staffed the cash tables and handled all the work associated with the purchases of books and puzzles, served as floor walkers and assisted people as needed, tidied up the boxes of books throughout the day as needed, removed empty boxes from the tables and filled in and helped wherever needed; at the close of our Book Sale, volunteers assisted in the moving of all remaining boxes of books back to the sorting area, removing all signage and all other items in the lobby so that Mall employees could dismantle and remove all the empty tables on May 29; prepared the floats for the cash boxes and completed any associated banking business
- On May 29, volunteers assisted in the repacking of the boxes of books in readiness for their removal by members from the St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church in Lincoln; there were a number of boxes which needed to be cut and removed to the recycling bins and volunteers did this
- Throughout May 26, 27, 28, 29, volunteers removed the empty boxes and delivered them to a storage location; volunteers delivered boxes of books to the Salvation Army; some books needed to be recycled and volunteers took these books to the recycling areas; volunteers cleared the sorting area of all items except for those items going to St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church
- On May 30, volunteers, along with 2 members from the Church, assisted in the removal of boxes of books, puzzles, and empty bags from the sorting area out to their truck; any remaining empty boxes were either taken for storage or cut down for recycling and volunteers did this work; by the end of the day, all work was completed and the sorting area was empty.

Again, all this work happened because of YOU—our fabulous volunteers!!!!

I have outlined all the work done by you, our fabulous volunteers, as every job you did and every hour you spent volunteering played a significant role and resulted in an

extremely successful CFUW Fredericton Pop-Up Book Sale. Many people who came to make book donations expressed how happy they were that CFUW Fredericton was holding a Book Sale. Many people who came to our Book Sale on Friday and Saturday were overjoyed we were back with such a great selection of books. Preparing and posting information on CFUW Fredericton Facebook apprised readers of what was happening related to our sorting/donation days and Book Sale days

YOU, our fabulous volunteers, played a most important role as without you we would not have been able to prepare for and host our Book Sale!!!!!

Issues Committee 2022-2023 (7A)

At the end of my first year as Committee Convener, I am pleased to present this report for 2022-2023.

Awareness-raising has been the major focus of our efforts during this period. In late March 2023, we organized a Webinar on a timely and important topic, shedding light on the plight of incarcerated women in Canada. Featured speaker Dr. Martha Paynter from the UNB Faculty of Nursing spoke about the appalling situation of reproductive health and parenting conditions still experienced by a largely invisible population. Dr. Paynter is a founding member of Wellness Within, a Nova Scotia based non-profit organization that serves and advocates for women and transgender/non-binary people who have experienced criminalization and are pregnant or have young children. The Webinar attracted a large number of non-members, including some from Elizabeth Fry Society New Brunswick, and sparked questions about what individuals and groups can do to provide aid and support change. Thank you to committee member Bo Miedema, for suggesting this compelling topic and arranging for this powerful speaker.

Violence against women is an issue that has mobilized women's energies world-wide for decades. The recent inquiry into the 2020 mass shootings in Nova Scotia called it a "national epidemic" that requires "a "meaningful, whole of society response." In late 2022, we marked the 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence, an international campaign launched more than 30 years ago, by sharing information and action suggestions with our members. For each of the 16 days from November 25 to December 10, we emailed quick facts from the CFUW National toolkit along with New Brunswick specific statistics and policy information from a variety of sources. Some members offered thoughts on legislative change, policy and prevention initiatives.

We continue to learn about new and longstanding issues and make efforts to promote awareness beyond our group. Our club has also at times participated in advocacy, that can be defined as "any action that speaks in favour of, recommends, argues for a cause, supports or defends, or pleads on behalf of others." In recent years, for example, the club has sent letters

supporting health care reform and pay equity for care sector workers. We could use our group voice in other focused ways to endorse calls for action of non-partisan or research organizations dedicated to shared goals, such as the Muriel McQueen Fergusson Centre for Family Violence Research, the NB Common Front for Social Justice or the NB Coalition for Pay Equity.
